Despite their occupational risks, farmers are unlikely to receive preventive health care from a professional specially trained in the field of agricultural occupational health. Rural practitioners are well positioned to integrate occupational agricultural health care into the primary care setting. Rural providers must be trained to recognize symptoms that are agriculture-related and then must be capable of recommending personal protective equipment and education to improve the symptoms. AgriSafe aims to shift the quality of care towards an occupational approach so that farmers can receive the same occupational care afforded to other industries.

The AgriSafe Network is a national membership organization founded in 2003 by health professionals trained to serve the unique health care needs of farm families.
